

A Moment With Mike

Every now and then, someone asks me how I prepare my sermons. So, I thought I would write about my process for this month's article. The process for preparing and delivering a sermon is different for each pastor, and it is somewhat a matter of personal style. Some pastors preach with a manuscript, so they can be sure to get every word right. Some preach with general notes to make sure they stay on track, and others preach without notes. When I was a part-time local licensed pastor in the early years of my ministry, I preached with notes. While in seminary, my preaching professor (Dr. J. Ellsworth Kalas, who was originally from Sioux City) had his students deliver sermons in class without notes, since this was how he had preached when he was a pastor. It was there that I found out I could do it and resolved to do so whenever possible. There are times when I feel I can do a better job with notes, such as during funerals and weddings or rare occasions for church on Sunday.

Sermon preparation starts with sermon planning. Each summer, I take a number of days to plan out my sermons for the upcoming year. I do not actually write out the sermons at that time, but I come up with sermon series subjects, sermon titles, scriptures to go with them, and a short summary of what each sermon will be exploring. I then send this out to our worship leaders, so they may



incorporate music that goes along with the theme, if desired. In order to write the sermon for a particular week, I start by reminding myself of that week's sermon and subject summary. I then look up the scriptures and write down notes as I read through them and any commentary included in my study Bible and/or commentary sets. By this time, I usually have an idea of the general flow of the sermon, and I will create a Word document and start typing. The details of the sermon come as I type. My typing is in outline form, though most of the words I will use are there. After the sermon is typed, it needs to be practiced in order to deliver it without notes. I usually need to practice the sermon with my notes two or three times, depending on the level of difficulty. Since I record a sermon podcast and also have a recording for our local radio station, these become a part of my practice with the notes. What this means is that if you listen to the podcast or the radio, the version of the sermon will be slightly different (and sometimes shorter) than the Sunday morning sermon. After practicing a couple of times with the notes, I then try to practice the sermon without notes. Depending on the difficulty, it may take a second try to get it, but it usually comes naturally. Some have wondered how I can memorize the sermon each week. The trick is that I do not actually memorize it word for word, which is why the recordings will be slightly different than Sunday morning. My sermon on Sunday morning will follow the general flow of the notes pretty well, but there may be some things in the notes that slip my mind. There may also be some elements that were not in the notes that end up in the sermon, based on how my mind works as I preach. The order of things may be slightly different as well. I do not let these small changes bother me, because I feel that the way it ends up being delivered must be a way that flows more naturally in my mind at the time I deliver it. As I mentioned earlier, there are many ways one could prepare and deliver a sermon. This is just the way that works for me.

God bless you as we begin this month. Pastor Mike Agnew

What is Pastor Mike Doing and Why?



You may have noticed some meetings and abbreviations in the weekly bulletin schedule and wondered what they mean. The United Methodist Church is a connectional denomination, which means that Pastor Mike has responsibilities in the greater UMC. Additionally, he is involved in a few community groups on behalf of St. Paul's. If you are interested in learning more, please see the explanations to follow.

dCOM

The District Committee on Ordained Ministry

Pastor Mike is co-registrar for the dCOM in the Camp Clear Lake District. This committee is responsible for maintaining a list and conducting interviews for all people who have declared their candidacy for ordained ministry and are pursuing candidacy studies, conducting interviews of candidates, recommending (or not) candidates for licensed or ordained ministry and an annual renewal of certification, recommending associate or provisional membership, recommending readmission to conference membership, and recommending certification as a Certified Lay Minister. As registrar, Pastor Mike keeps track of the paperwork for each candidate and lets candidates know what is required prior to and following the group interviews.

CRC of the BOM

Conference Relations Committee (A subcommittee of the Board of Ordained Ministry)

Rev. Gary Armstrong and Pastor Mike are co-chairs of the Conference Relations Committee. This group hears requests for discontinuance of provisional members, involuntary leave of absence, administrative location, involuntary retirement, involuntary medical leave, and other matters. When clergy seek a change in conference relationship, the CRC should meet with the clergy to discuss the request, consider the needs surrounding the request, and inform the clergy member of the process related to changing their active status. The CRC should also inform the clergyperson of the steps required to return to active status in the future.

Clergy Circuit Meeting

Full-time clergy in the Iowa Conference are required to be in a circuit that meets once a month for 6-8 hours, and laity are encouraged to join as well. Pastor Mike is in Circuit A, led by Pastor Travis Stevick of Marcus, which had been meeting online but has recently started meeting in person here at St. Paul's. Per the conference's website, "the purpose of Circuit Ministry is to develop a circuit of missionally effective clergy and laity leading together in partnership through 1. Leadership Multiplication [and] 2. Missional Accountability & Oversight." For more information, please read the rest of this article at https://www.iaumc.org/circuits.



CPE

Clinical Pastoral Education

Pastors are required to take continuing education units (CEUs) each year. These can be obtained through a variety of classes and conferences. Pastor Mike elected to earn his CEUs through CPE in 2022 and 2023. CPE is a class that pastors can take to gain experience in pastoral care, typically in a hospital setting. In his early years of ministry, Pastor Mike earned one unit of CPE through a hospital in St. Joseph, Missouri, which included a year -long weekly class and working an overnight chaplaincy shift once a month. In 2022, Pastor Mike earned a second unit of CPE through the Ecumenical Institute, housed at the Mental Health Institute, with clinical hours being within our local church. His instructor lives in Colorado and facilitated a weekly online discussion (March through August) with students from around the Midwest. The class included required reading, writing, and discussions, as well as pastoral care duties. Pastor Mike will be taking a third unit of CPE from March 30th through August 24th, 2023.

Rotary Club

Although we don't include it in the bulletin, Pastor Mike represents St. Paul's at Cherokee's Rotary Club. This is a service organization that has weekly lunch meetings on Mondays at The Family Table. Since Pastor Mike's day off is currently Mondays, he tries to attend roughly half of the meetings to balance his Sabbath rest and church responsibilities. Rotary is involved with the backpack program at the elementary school, where around 100 bags of food are packed and sent home with students who need them over the weekend. Pastor Mike helps pack the bags of food on most Fridays at 7:00 a.m.

Chamber Coffee

Cherokee Chamber of Commerce

St. Paul's is a member of the Cherokee Chamber of Commerce. A big benefit of this membership is that we are able to include information (a St. Paul's magnet) in the welcome bags that are distributed to new residents of Cherokee. Although we don't include it in the bulletin, Pastor Mike attends Friday Chamber Coffees whenever he doesn't have another commitment. You may have seen his picture on social media at some of the events (Or maybe not, as he is notorious for standing behind light poles or behind other people. He spent too much time reading Where's Waldo as a child!).

"What is Lent and why does it last forty days?"

"Lent is a season of PETURN forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon word lencten,

meaning "lengthen" and refers to the lengthening days of spring. The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry.

Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of selfexamination and reflection. In the early church, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by new converts and then became a time of penance by all Christians. Today, Christians focus on [their] relationship with God, growing as disciples and extending ourselves, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of ourselves for others.

Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a 'mini-Easter.' This is why you will see the designation 'Sunday in Lent' rather than 'Sunday of Lent' in the naming of these Sundays. On each Lord's Day in Lent, while Lenten fasts continue, the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection."


Ash Wednesday Service

The Finance Committee met on Thursday, January 5th, at 7 p.m. in Schuldt Dining Hall, at which time we were given the 2022 closing numbers. We had nearly made our 2022 budget, falling short by only \$1,500; however, we continued to receive 2022 funding in 2023. We made it! We will start 2023 in the black. (Remember, as of September 30th, the deficit between giving and expenses in the general fund had grown to \$34,660.) We were able to pay 100% of our commitment to the general church apportionments and 75% of the missions and ministries apportionments. Way to go, St. Paul's UMC family! 
